- **ADGSS** Anthropology, Developmental, Geography, Social Sciences
- **EDU** Education
- **EMAA** Economics Management Administration Accounting

3 Voices

A panel comprises:

Specialist Committee Assessor Chairperson

Members of the panel assess

6 reviewers' reports/application

score and interpret rating of each

A panellist's prospective:

Tackling PJs, possible PJs and publishers, non-accredited journals

- **Compiled a list of PJs, possible PJs and predatory publishers**, based on the “old” Beall’s list, internet searches, common knowledge & collective wisdom
- **Compiled a list of accreditation status** of journals used by applicants in the relevant disciplines (ADGSS, EDU and EMAA)
- **Compiled a set of guidelines for usability of reviewer reports**
Note: reviewer template asks reviewers if portfolio included PJs
- **Reviewer reports that:**
 - Do not identify the use of PJs
 - Stated categorically PJs not used
 - Failed to discuss a preponderance of PJs/lower-tier unaccredited journals/**patterns** of overuse of lower quality outputs in an applicant’s portfolio.

Were scored 2/3 or 3

Relevance to the rating process and a researcher's rating

- Assessing one of the crucial criteria for NRF rating:
quality of research as measured by outputs in credible journals
- To award a rating need 4-6 good reviewer reports
scored 1, 1/2 or 2
- Failure to address the quality of journals used:
reviewer report score of 2/3 (not used to sway a decision)
or score of 3 (not used)
- More reports requested

Challenges encountered in implementation

- Fluidity in what constitutes a PJ, possible PJ, accredited/unaccredited journal
- Non-consensus among stakeholders (NRF, DHET, institutions, panellists, researchers)
- Anxiety among stakeholders of a “witch hunt”
- What percentage of these categories of outputs is acceptable within a portfolio?
- Applicants “hiding” such publications (on the advice of their institutions/research offices?). The panels/NRF have viewed this as **unethical**

Challenges encountered (cont)

- Reviewers not discussing use of PJ/lower impact unaccredited journals and delivering unrealistically positive report emphasising quality
- Disgard reviewer reports (given in good faith – **unethical?**)
- Long turn-around time in ratings process as more reviewer reports are solicited
- Lengthy correspondence between applicant/the institution, defending their portfolio, and the NRF
- Increase in applications to the Appeals committee

- Panel members consult their list of PJs/possible PJs/accredited journals
- DHET list of PJs/possible PJs/dubious publication outlets changes
- Reviewers and SC members express disparate opinions on standing of some journals

Publication pattern

- **PJ:** Med J of Social Sci (3)
- **On/Off/On DHET accredited journals:**
 - J of Human Ecology (4 publications)
 - Studies of Tribes and Tribalism (2)
 - Studies in Ethnomedicine (3)
 - J of Soc Sci (5)
- Applicant has 35 journal articles in portfolio
17/35 are PJs/possible PJs

49% of portfolio PJs/possible PJs/unaccredited Js

CASE 2: The case of the missing articles

- Applicant listed **72** articles in the peer-reviewed category
- Narrative sections stated:

*My total research outputs have increased steadily from about 21 publications as at 2008, to more than **140** publications in 2015.*

*During the past 8 years, I have conducted extensive research in sub-Saharan Africa (SSA), which has produced more than **115** publications. These papers have been published in more than 55 international journals.*

Cont: The unethical case of the missing articles

- Applicant concealed 42 outputs in PJs/non-accredited journals/no ISBN/ISSN numbers
- States an output of 114 peer-reviewed articles (confirmed in NRF-generated Research Outputs table).
- The number of articles listed in the appropriate section of his rating application (visible to reviewers) is 72
- Consequence:
 - reviewers commended high productivity
 - do not see hidden predatory and other lower ranked journals
- In the full research portfolio, overuse of such journals (37%) would negatively affect overall rating. Hiding them would enhance it
- Applicant acted on advice in consultation with the Institution
- **The case threatens the integrity of the NRF rating system, it impacts on time and costs and it is unfair to candidates who work within the system to achieve the desired outcome**
 - Outcome: discussions between NRF and Institution

Case 3: Hidden article + supervised students using PJs

- PJs in application:
- *Mediterranean Journal of Social Science* (2)
- *Journal of Governance and Regulation* (1)
- *3/19 outputs* (16%) acceptable percentage?
- .Further analysis: co-authored paper with PhD student hidden:
 - Corporate Ownership & Control* a PJ 4/19 (21%)
 - 4 other listed non-co-authored best student outputs in PJs/possible PJs:
 - Corporate Ownership & Control* (1), *Journal of Governance and Regulation* (1)
 - and *Mediterranean Journal of Social Science* (2)

Case 3: Hidden article + students using PJs

Outcome: discussions between NRF and Institution

Suggestions for the way forward

- Stakeholders (NRF, DHET, academia) compile:
 - 1) a list of acceptable journals
 - 2) a list of unaccredited journals
 - 3) a list of journals that should be avoided (predatory/dubious)

commence with short lists, continuously update
- Responsibility of the institution and researcher to be aware of the acceptability of journals and have access to the lists. Allow reviewers access to the lists
- Allow individual motivation for publishing in journals that are not (yet?) officially accredited on any database – or whose status has changed

Cont:

- Change the naming of research output categories on the application template:
 - *From:* Articles in refereed/peer reviewed journals
To: Articles in refereed/peer reviewed accredited journals (with lists available on NRF website – advising applicants and reviewers).
 - Add a section in which applicants tick DHET, ISI, SCOPUS listed journals
 - *From:* Articles in non-refereed/non peer reviewed journals
To: Articles in non-refereed/non-peer reviewed/non-accredited journals

Cont:

- Set up an IT system that flags any journals on the list of PJ/possibly PJ or non-accredited journals in an application. Convey this to applicant/institution/reviewer
- Notify the Specialist Committee who will decide on action to be taken (in consultation with RE manager and institution)
- Make it clear that listing outputs in the wrong category of outputs is **unethical**
Journals not eligible for the peer-reviewed/accreditedd category can be listed in the non-peer-reviewed/non-accredited category
- Make it clear that “hiding” journals is **unethical**

Another Chairperson's comments

- **I think we should stop the majority of predatory issues before they reach the assessment stage.** We cannot seamlessly shift the responsibility onto reviewers and then if they do not meet our list of expectations **we cannot discard these reviewer reports.** If the NRF has a rule about predatory journals, the NRF should inform Institutions what they are allowed to list or not list and if these rules are not applied **send the applications back with the motivational relevant detail.**
- It can be **computerised** what is out and what is in. If it is argued that it cannot be done, why should a panel or a reviewer be able to do it?? You have had panels and assessors that took this responsibility very seriously but to expect that to be the norm amongst all panels, Chairs and assessors is a big ask.
- I think all publications with questionable reviewer policies (or not on the NRF list of acceptable) should be **listed under a separate heading in the application.** I am convinced that a number of these may still have fair or even substantial merit and a reviewer may just comment that some of these papers have made a solid contribution and could well have been published in better journals. It will take the sting out of the predatory journal issue and still allow the candidate to get some recognition for what has been published.
